An Ocean Free of Plastic





Even when the suction is protected with a net like hatch it could lead to reduction in suction thereby reducing the ship's speed to half its capacity or zero when fully blocked. This is a limitation and a disadvantage to the manufacturers of this kind of propulsion system as well as the users who benefits from its maneuverability and speed.
